

FROM MY WINDOW IN THE SQUARE

I count myself in nothing else so happy
As in a soul
remembering my good friends

In his play Richard II, Shakespeare expressed exactly what I felt when I revisited my homeland, Canton de Vaud in Switzerland. How frequently am I asked "Have you been home lately?" which always astonishes me because I have lived in England for more than half my life, thirty seven of them in glorious East Devon. For me my only home is The Old Manse in The Square.

This year, my journey to Switzerland was a very special mission. I was revisiting Grandson Castle on the shores of Lake Neuchatel which is the ancestral home and family seat of Bishop John de Grandison, who was in St Peters Cathedral, Exeter in 1327-1369.

When we moved to Exeter in 1963, everybody was asking us had we been to the Grandison Service on Christmas Eve and if not, why not? We got the impression that this bishop had recently left the diocese, to discover that in fact he was here in the Middle Ages. Being very fond of history and being intrigued by this bishop, I soon discovered something fascinating - he actually came from Switzerland. For the last thirty years I have studied this subject in great depth, having given lectures and have correspondents on the subject all over the world. At the Cathedral library where I spent most of my time, I was finally dubbed "The Grandison Lady".

In 1980, I was asked by the editor of The Swiss Observer in London to take on the task of reporting the Queen's visit to Switzerland, an offer you can well imagine I could not refuse. About the same time, I also received a telephone call from the curator of Grandson Castle. Unbeknown to me, he had read my article in Devon Life January 1980 entitled "Twinning 1330 Style" and I received the most strange request from him.

I gathered from the conversation that the castle was going to be sold to an Arab sheikh and closed forever to the public. This caused quite a furore in Switzerland and I was asked to come over and launch an appeal to the whole Swiss nation to save this most historic castle. So I left a day earlier before my assignment as reporter and went to Lausanne Cathedral at the foot of the tomb of the knight of great renown, Othon 1 of Grandson, uncle of our own John de Grandison and spoke to the Swiss nation.

We were all delighted to see that Malcolm, one of Roy's sons, had come down especially from Yorkshire to join us.

Graham Gibbons started the ball rolling by talking about his memories of Roy, and what he loved about him. This was the reason we were there, and soon any sad feelings quickly disappeared, as one by one, people from all over the area stood up in the pews and shared their thoughts. I was delighted that Roy had so many friends, and it was lovely to see that they all wanted to be involved in this service. Soon we were all smiling and laughing at these stories, just remembering the good times. The finale of all these contributions came from 'TV Clive' who had composed his tribute in verse. I never knew that we had such an excellent wordsmith amongst us, and it is reproduced after this article. When Clive had finished, the friends just broke into spontaneous applause, as he had captured the moment so well.

After the service, we all went back to the New Fountain to enjoy an excellent buffet supplied by Paul and Gill. The Fountain was packed with his friends - I know that Roy would have loved it. It was a very long day for Paul and Gill, and we all appreciated their efforts - thank you very much.

The Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral of Saint Peter in Exeter send greetings to the Diocese of Lausanne.

Bishop Grandison will never be forgotten in this Diocese of Exeter where during a long episcopate of forty years he left an indelible mark on the life of the church, building the beautiful church of Ottery St. Mary and almost completing the building of the cathedral church of St Peter.

We hope your efforts to preserve for the nation Castle Grandson will be crowned with the success they deserve.

AN AUSTRALIAN FAMILY IN WHIMPLE

Caitlin (14), Conor (11), Siobhan (9), Sue and Tony arrived in the land of Whymple on 25 Jan 2000. For 12 months we have swapped jobs, houses, cars, cats and guinea pigs with the McLauchlan family of Dince Hill Close. Chris McLauchlan and I work as Emergency Physicians and have kept in touch after working together in Yeovil in 1982-3.

Having had a great experience working at the Cork University Hospital, Ireland for 4 months in 1996, our family was very keen to experience life in a Devon village. However, contrary to media reports it is not easy for aliens to enter England. We had to go through the rigours of an English Language Proficiency Test, battle the bureaucracy of the Departments of Immigration, Education and Employment, and pay considerable sums of money to the British High Commission before they would even talk to us, let alone issue us with visas. So what's it like and what's different to living in Woombye (Aboriginal for place of the black snake) on the Sunshine Coast in Queensland?

More than 40 neighbours and friends came to a 'Welcome to Whimple/ Bon Voyage to Australia' party held at the McLauchlans. A warm hearth mixed together with fine wine, cider, ale and easy going Whimple-ites made us feel at ease immediately. Our experience since then has been one of support and friendliness from everyone we have met, and the sense of community pride and spirit is obvious.

Our children have quickly settled into school life in spite of the adjustments they have had to make. Siobhan attends Whimple Primary which is a much smaller school than the one at home which has over 600 students. Conor has been elevated to Secondary School here, whereas at home the transition is in Year

8. He buses to Kings School at Ottery. Caitlin attends Clystvale Community College and has gone back a school year because of her

Pineapples - so how do they grow? They are grown on very steep slopes to allow for drainage, they are planted by hand (tops of pineapples grow pineapples), and each one takes 2 years to grow! And they cost us less than 50p for a huge one! Guess what has become our staple diet.

Bugs! Plenty of them, the amounts and variations are like nothing either Chris or I have ever witnessed before. Snakes, spiders, cockroaches, preying mantis, flying cockroaches, giant moths, mosquitoes, lizards and that's only in the house! Not really, they are just everywhere. I looked as though I had the plague at one stage, covered in huge great itchy red lumps caused by our little tiny but vicious friend the mosquito.

We came across a snake in the Bunya Mountains. Almost back to base after a walk in a rainforest and there he was, larger than life, a 6 foot carpet python. Very exciting, sort of Indiana Jonesish. Eventually the snake moved to one side and we all tiptoed past it.

Autumn has arrived after sharing with you all a very wet April. It rained (tropical stuff) for almost three weeks but the last few days have cheered everybody considerably. Warm sunny days and cooler nights (24C days and 16C nights). In fact the cane toads seem to have disappeared. The cane toads, big ugly toads that are not indigenous and have become somewhat of a plague in Queensland and are making their way South. They were first introduced to eat cane beetles but unfortunately didn't have that explained to them fully, and therefore do not!

Its now 10pm which means that most of you will be eating your lunch (9 hrs time difference). I am off to bed, as the sun has no respect here for those of us who need our 10 hours sleep. It rises at 5am and so, occasionally, does one of our offspring.



FROM OUR VERANDA IN THE HILLS

Dear Whimple,

It has been almost four months now since we said our farewells and began our journey to Oz. And what a journey that was. Amy (4) and Laura (2) refused to sleep on a 21 hour flight which meant that their parents too had very little sleep. Customs officials, 2 children under 5 and 21 hours of sleep deprivation, not a pretty picture. Fortunately on leaving Brisbane airport terminus the picture did indeed become more attractive, perhaps not immediately but definitely within the next few weeks (it took us that long to sort out our body clocks).



We are living in the Harrington's home (they are those funny Australian lot who have infiltrated our village) and they are living in ours.

The house is on a hill overlooking cane and pineapple fields. Pineapples are harvested continually but the sugar cane is another story.

During the months of April and May what looks to be a derelict factory in the centre of Nambour becomes a hive of activity. This is in preparation for the beginning of the harvesting and crushing of the sugar cane. The harvesting trains run through the centre of the town out to the cane growing areas. These lumbering trains bring the town to a grinding go-slow, no four wheel drive would challenge one of these, I'm sure (there are plenty of four wheel drives here, well I suppose one visit a year to nearby Fraser Island, largest sand Island in the world, does justify having one).

The children cannot wait to see the trains in action. Laura's pre-school is opposite the factory and lines, and Amy's is beside one of the tracks - so exciting.

late birthday. Already, they have many friends and Siobhan has the makings of an English accent!

We were happy to find that sporting facilities are good, as all the children play sports at home. They are able to continue their activities in tennis, basketball and soccer, but do miss outdoor swimming. As befits an English gentleman Conor has developed an interest in cricket and has joined the Whimple Under 12 Team. It's much more pleasant playing in the long evenings here than under the blazing sun at home.

As we live in a subtropical area we see very little seasonal variation (from very hot to not so hot) so for us one of the fantastic things about living here is the cycle of change in the countryside during the four seasons. We have experienced beautiful clear frosty days; mist and fog, sleet and snow, drizzle and rain that seems to last forever and cold winds that penetrate your bones. The cold weather has been the most difficult adjustment.

While bike riding along Exeter quayside in winter Siobhan collapsed crying in pain "I can't feel my hands or face!" With the warmer weather we have witnessed the emergence of new life, both plant and animal and have welcomed the opportunity to be able to be outdoors more. We've enjoyed seeing the first daffodils, the blossoming trees and the young lambs in the fields. The children have been delighted to see animals that we don't readily see at home such as squirrels, rabbits and foxes, and Siobhan

was nearly bitten by a snake outside Whimple Primary School. That seemed more familiar!

We have rapidly grown to feel at home in Whimple. The village has a timelessness about it that we appreciate, coming as we do from a land where nothing European is more than 200 years old. We are used to wooden houses, wide open spaces, sugar cane farms and pineapple plantations, so being in a village with thatched cottages, colourful gardens, a stream and a church with bells is a very different experience. We enjoy walking around and just taking in all the pleasant sights and sounds of rural life. The Cricket Club, the Tennis Club, the local pubs, the Station House Tearoom and Fred's shop have become familiar places where we always find a friendly face and we've been fortunate to land amongst neighbours without peer. The best local paper is the Whimple News and I especially look forward to
