one for the older readers -What should be the next number in the following series of numbers


3 6 12 24 30 60 ?

Whimble Millennium Photo

Last summer, when the Whimble History Society were considering their events for the year 2000, I suggested a photograph of the residents of the Village as a future record of all those living in Whimble at the start of the century. The first thought was to have it taken in the Square but we quickly realised that the area was too small - there are 1500 residents and we needed somewhere capable of taking 500 - 750 people.

We chose the sports field at Knowle Cross as it also suited the photographer who needed to be 20 feet above. Using the corner of the field meant that the church tower and house roofs would also appear in the background.

I was very pleased when 520 people turned up on the windy evening of 9th June. All duly took their places, carefully sized from small to tall, front to back, for the photograph. In addition, 18 village organisations took the opportunity to be photographed. A copy of all the photographs have been entered into the archives of the History Society.

120 people ordered one or more of the photographs on Village Day and by now they should all have received copies. The History Society will be displaying all of them in the Square on Saturday 12th August from 9am to noon when further orders will be accepted. Mugs showing Whimble scenes will also be on sale.

On Wednesday, the weather wasn't very kind but we had an amazing turnout for the Walking Treasure Hunt. Great fun was had by all.



WHIMBLE HERITAGE CENTRE

Whimble History Society plan to have a Heritage Centre in the village to display the artefacts and archives they are continually gathering.

After scanning over 20 possible sights they have decided to purchase the lincay (barn) in the grounds of The New Fountain Inn. They will then renovate it, extend rearwards and construct a carpark (required by planning regulations).

The Society is in negotiation to buy the building and required land and hopes to complete the purchase this summer.

The whole project will cost about £150,000. They plan to apply to the National Heritage Lottery, East Devon District Council and other grant giving bodies for about 75% of the cost. The remainder they are required to raise themselves before the current regulations allow them to make these applications. To date they have raised £31,000 and need a further £6,500.

As a means of raising this amount there will be a Grand Heritage Raffle with 1st Prize of £500, 2nd Prize £200, 3rd Prize £50 plus many other prizes. Tickets cost 50p and are on sale from History Society members and The New Fountain Inn. They will also be on sale in The Square on Saturday 12th August from 9pm to noon and also in The Victory Hall on the evening of Friday 29th September when the draw for prizes will take place.

The support of the readers would be appreciated in assisting The Society in their fund raising efforts.
