

FROM MY WINDOW IN THE SQUARE

A frosty Christmas Eve when stars were shining
Fared I forth alone where westward falls the hill
And from many a village in the watered valley
Distant music reached me peals of bells a—ringing
But to me heard afar it was the starry music
Angels sang comforting as the comfort of Christ
When he spoke tenderly to his sorrowing flock
The old words came to me by the riches of time
Mellow and transfigured as I stood on the hill
leark'ning in the aspect of the Eternal silence

I always feel a great thankfulness and joy come the Christmas-tide mainly because it is the season of good will. Kindness abounds; messages of love arrive daily, and to me it is free-hearted. It is the time to give; it is the time to receive. To be the object of affection and in return have affection is certainly the best form of happiness life can offer. I am blessed to have more than my share. Love is curative and to express it softens us. It also closes the distances. Knowing that we love and are loved gives us strength and makes our existence special. We all need each other.

Shaded and sheltered by the old Church tower, whose bells toll gently each passing hour, I sit by my blazing fire in this old stone house dressed in soft white walls. This house is far gayer than my neighbours do think. There is a bundle of fur soon curled up in my lap, purring and full of love, Suki's affection so sweet, my reciprocation to her affection is a treat. Even the owls hoot in the night, just to assure me: all's well and all right. I always remember one night in December when I heard the heavenly sound of a bird, my favourite robin. The notes were like bells which reflected the joy of his song. With the lights shining brightly in The Square he often thinks it is daylight. I wish I could sing like that in the night; my reward, like the bird 's, is an awakening light.

In the house I have decorations of holly which connects me with its symbolic role in winter. Holly seems always to have been an emblem of continuity and constancy in the landscape and respected as such. All over Britain, or at least in those areas favoured by its fascinating patchy distribution, it marks portals and boundaries. In Cornwall hollies were planted to mark the courses of tin lodes. In some areas of arable England they were even left standing when hedges were grubbed out and their darkly brooding silhouettes are still used as sightlines during winter ploughing

Evergreen suggests the continuance of life, red berries with all the ambivalence too for danger. So many beliefs linger on in different countries, and English counties, that one wonders what inner processes, both in the world and ourselves, give a sense of connectedness of things that we are only just beginning to recapture. Between the extremes of traditional conviction and the newer proven scientific facts, is the reassuring sight of a glossy green tree with shining red berries in the dark of winter.

In my garden when the weather is still relatively mild the birds find plenty of nutritious food to keep them going. My blackbirds particularly favour the haws, they also feed avidly on my red crab-apple which I keep for them; whereas the song thrushes show a preference for yew berries. It is not only the thrushes that are attracted to the deep red clusters of hawthorn berries. Flocks of greenfinches are also a familiar sight at this time of the year. The thrushes seem to like the fleshy part of the berry, whereas the greenfinches' interest is the nutritious kernel which lies inside the stone. It is fascinating to watch how they crack the stone in a matter of seconds with their specially designed broad heavy beak. The tits and sparrow rely more on peanut bags and fatballs hung under the trees in the garden

This is also the time of the year when the postman delivers envelopes and little parcels full of those symbols of the season to come:- packets of seeds. Each year I marvel at the pleasure that nursery catalogues and pictorial seed packets give me. They feed the inner world of illusions and dreams. As a child I was always presented with little packets of seeds. I stared at magic visions of picturesque thatch—covered cottages amidst an explosion of hollyhocks, marigolds, sweet smelling stocks. All purveyors of seed catalogues play on that inner Arcady, on the hankering for the lost garden of Eden. The vegetables on the labels are always beautifully turned out and of lush proportions. They are always grown in neat tended rows with never a slug in sight. Books on gardens are plentiful in my house. The text usually is secondary, but the photos preferably in lush colour are everything. Like the coloured picture of the cottage garden on seed packets they swing open a window into an Arcadia that is peculiarly English. Half the delight of gardening for me is this constant dream of seeing glorious blooms nodding in the breeze.

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FROM WHIMPLE TO SOUTH OF FRANCE

(The continuing diaries of two former inhabitants of Whimple, Janine and Paul Peryer)

In April we had our official welcome from Monsieur le Marie. He resembled a cross between Graham from Whimple Stores and Compo from Last of the Summer Wine. We also have a loudspeaker on the post next to our house and every morning at 10.30am there are village announcements. The mayor first of all sings a song very badly! It is like karaoke gone wrong. Then he gives you the 'message of the day', followed by the secretary screaming other messages for several people in the village, followed by five minutes of music in very bad taste! Luckily it doesn't go on very long. The whole thing is like an old fashioned film.

Interesting places to visit near us are some wonderful underground wine cellars in an old tin mine. The medieval city of Carcassonne (a world heritage site) and the museum of Salvador Dali are not far away. Also a fabulous little hotel for meals.

And now I want to tell you about the 'wildlife' here in France. We had an electrician here to price up a rewiring job and he had to look at the state of the wires in the loft. Well, his reaction was 'vous avez une probleme'. He showed us a handful of rat droppings.. I had been telling Paul for days it was noisy in the loft but we put it down to bats. Off I went to buy the biggest rat trap you have ever seen! They don't call it 'the little nipper' here, like the English ones, but 'Lucifer'.

Lucifer was put to the test with a huge chunk of cheese dripping in chocolate on (you've guessed it) a croissant! Well the next day an almighty bang. .it was a BIG trap after all and 'bingo' one rat trapped... .well half trapped. He must have caught his leg in one side of the trap because for the next four days we heard Plop plop plop bang! Plop plop plop bang as Monsieur 'Le Rat' wandered around with Lucifer on one of his feet. We were so excited that we immediately bought two more Lucifers. Tres bien; it has all gone quiet now... until last night. Bold as brass a mouse came walking calmly through the living room. Tomorrow little lucifers will be acquired.

And there's more. In the evening you hear the biggest choir of toads and frogs. Also we hear strange howling and barking. Are they wolves in the foothills of the Pyrenees or stray dogs? We also regularly see flamingos fly over at night who come to eat mussels and oysters in the lagoons by the coast.

The butterflies are stunning like you used to see years ago. The birds are different so I had to buy a book on them. We have lots of lizards in the garden. It is funny to see them turn their heads when I talk to them. There are snakes too, one a metre long and that was a baby. Our electrician told us of a daddy snake three metres long curled up on the seat of his van beside him.

We've got a plumber starting to fit a new bathroom, boiler and en-suite. In order to do the latter, he had to dig a large trench through the drive to connect up with the sewage pipe. A huge JCB turned up and not only dug up half my plants and veg. but also went straight through the mains. This put the village without water for two hours. Bearing in mind it was 40°c degrees, everything tinder dry and farmers needing every drop of l'eau for their vines, we were not too popular... Within two minutes Monsieur le Marie was on the scene to survey the damage, wave his red face about, throw his arms in the air and say 'c'est la vie'. He then disappeared to shout an announcement over the tannoy that due to a mishap at the Peryers there was no water in a third of the village for a few hours... Needless to say I went shopping in a large hat the next day.

NEWS FROM OTTER ROTTERS

Our continued thanks to the staff in Whimple Stores and the PO for selling our tags and bags. A slight change on the tag front is that we are dropping use of rubber bands, so would you simply leave your tags under a brick please, ideally use two bricks, to keep the tags clear of the ground and therefore dry! Quite a lot of detail, but it all helps when you have to repeat tasks over and over again! I hope you like our garden bags, they are very good value and nearly twice the size of the 70 litre compost bag.

By the time this is published we hope to be using a tipper lorry bought via the CRED fund, which exists to aid environmentally and community directed ventures. This should provide a smoother and swifter collection process and will be indispensable in Honiton where we have also started rounds on Mondays and Wednesdays. Incidentally, we are continuing all the rounds throughout Winter to establish the demand, so you can get out into the garden and continue to clear and snip away as usual! We will also take your Christmas trees (one tags worth). Since starting in August despite routinely visiting Rull Farm and Wood Hayes lane, we have never had customers, so will only include these places if you phone please.

For those new to the scheme collections are fortnightly i.e. 7th Dec, 21st Dec, and so on, and we sell compost in bags or bulk. The bulk delivery is very good value if you are planning major changes in the garden.

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
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Christmas Carols in Whimple Square 7.00pm Christmas Eve

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



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

Computer Problems.



Dear Tech Support:

Last year I upgraded from Boyfriend 5.0 to Husband 1.0 and noticed a distinct slowdown in the overall performance, particularly in the flower and jewellery applications, which operated flawlessly under Boyfriend 5.0 In addition, Husband 1.0 uninstalled many other valuable programs, such as Romance 9.5 and Personal Attention 6.5, and then installed undesirable programs such as Football 5.0, Cricket 4.3, and F1 3.0. Conversation 8.0 no longer runs, and Housecleaning 2.6 simply crashes the system. I've tried running Nagging 5.3 to fix these problems, to no avail. What can I do?

Dear Desperate:

First, keep in mind that Boyfriend 5.0 is an Entertainment Package, while Husband 1.0 is an Operating System. Try to enter the command: "C:/ITHOUGHTYOULOVEDME" to download Tears 6.2, which should automatically install Guilt 3.0. If that application works as designed, Husband 1.0 should then automatically run the applications Jewellery 2.0 and Flowers 3.5. Remember, though, that overuse of the above application can cause Husband 1.0 to default to Grumpy Silence 2.5, Happy Hour 7.0, or Beer 6.1. Beer 6.1 is a very bad program that will create Snoring Loudly 10.8.

Whatever you do: DO NOT install Mother-in-law 1.0 or reinstall another Boyfriend program. These are not supported applications and will crash Husband 1.0. In summary, Husband 1.0 is a great program, but it does have limited memory and cannot learn new applications quickly. You might consider buying additional software to improve memory and performance. I personally recommend Hot Food 3.0 and Lingerie 7.7.

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
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


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HELPING LOCAL CAUSES WHEN YOU SHOP ON-LINE!

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
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WHIMPLE HERITAGE CENTRE

Passers by will have noticed the building activity that has been taking place at the rear of the Heritage Centre during the past months. This work has been the building of an extension to the Centre.

It was always planned to build such an extension as the History Society knew that the amount of artefacts and records held by them would more than fill the existing building. They still have items stored in two other buildings.

Fund-raising for the £100,000 required started in late 2000. It was thought that it would take between six and eight years to raise. Due to generous donations from some members this sum was raised this year, allowing the building work to take place a few years earlier than planned.

The extension will be a new wing to the Centre comprising another gallery, toilets, storage areas for records and for artefacts not on display, and offices. It will allow the present records storage area to also become a gallery.

Building work will be completed by the end of this year. The Society's Committee will then set about fitting out the interior for use as galleries etc. It is planned for this to be completed in time for next year's opening of the Centre in April.

The members of the Society will be having a preview of the building work on 30th December, the anniversary of the death of the Society's late Chairman, John Shepherd.

The new wing will be formally opened in April and will be named 'The Whiteway Wing'. This is to commemorate the over 100 years of Whiteway Cyder Co Ltd operating in the village, the custody of that firm's archives and historical items being gifted to the Society and the generosity of the Whiteway family towards the Centre project.

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
