We know our phone lines are busy, we have additional lines in place and at present the staff to man them. Use e-consult as an alternative if you need help with a medical problem.

A new booking system is now in place - please only phone on the day you need help. You will not be able to book in advance without speaking to a clinician first.

From now on Whimple surgery will be closed to the public.

Our plan is to maintain access to doctors and nurses to help those who are medically unwell. We can only do this by putting measures in place to keep you and all the staff here as safe as possible.

It is difficult to predict what will happen with the Coronavirus. We intend to stay open for as long as possible. We have worked very hard to keep a good stock of produce and we will continue to try to keep supplies going and to keep our staff and customers as safe as possible.

If you don't normally use the Village shop, we welcome you and hope to see you back in the future. If you are a regular user we thank you for your support. Looking forward, we are still working hard to improve things at the shop and, in the near future, we are hoping to replace the shop floor as there are currently some areas of damage that are becoming increasingly harder to cover.

To allow us to do this the shop will need to be closed for a week and, as soon as a date has been agreed, we will let you know.

The book-cycle in the shop is still going well, with good donations being forwarded onto Whimple Scouts. The aim of this is to allow people to swap books or to take a book to read. We try to keep the area tidy by keeping books in crates, in single layers, for easy access. We would politely ask people not to deposit lots of books as this makes the area messy and unusable.

Whimple Neighbourhood Plan - Update

What is a neighbourhood plan?

Neighbourhood plans are led by authorised local community organisations (Parish or Town Councils) rather than the local council's planning department. This means that community representatives write the plan themselves (or ask others to assist in the writing of the plan, but under their control).

Parish/town councils preparing plans have the opportunity to engage properly with the wider community right from the beginning of the plan preparation process, to make sure it genuinely represents the range of wants and needs in the local area.

A neighbourhood plan is a planning framework for guiding the future development, regeneration and conservation of an area. It is about the use and development of land and may contain a vision, aims, planning policies, proposals for improving the area or providing new facilities, or allocation of key sites for specific kinds of development. It may deal with a wide range of social, economic and environmental issues (such as housing, employment, heritage and transport and green wedges).

There are three main stages to producing a neighbourhood plan

Stage 1 (which has been completed for the Whimple NP) - Getting established

The first step for parish/town councils or prospective neighbourhood forums wishing to prepare a neighbourhood plan is to submit their proposed neighbourhood area to the local planning authority for designation. Due to legislative changes it was possible to change the NP boundary to be the full Whimple Parish Boundary. This was previously declined by EDDC when making the original NP boundary application. A revised request was therefore made by the clerk to EDDC in 2020 to change to the full Parish Boundary for the NP boundary and this has now been accepted.

Cllr S Randall Johnson is the lead for the Whimple NP supported by Cllr A McArthur as her deputy lead. Sara will head up the Overview NP Committee and the other members of the committee will be the Chairs of each of the four steering groups (see below).

Stage 2 - Preparing the plan

Preparing to write a neighbourhood plan includes publicity, development of local partnerships, community consultation and engagement and the building of an evidence base. This will inform the development of a vision and/or aims for the plan. These in turn will inform the formulation of policy and, where appropriate, site allocations. Community engagement and consultation will be necessary at all stages of the plan-making process.

The Parish Councillors held a Neighbourhood Plan (NP) committee meeting on Monday 2nd March. Councillors were pleased to see the level of support and

agreed to increase the number of members of public and the POW+R in each of the steering groups to include all those who expressed an interest. This will ensure the process can move forward more quickly. The Terms of Reference for the NP will be amended by resolution in the next Parish Meeting.

The Chairman and Vice Chairman of each of the Steering Groups are shown below. For clarity the numbers of MOP shown below includes some POW+R members.

It is planned that a meeting is held in late March where Councillors and members of the Steering Groups will be invited to attend a launch Meeting. This will include an overview of the NP process and a 'where we are to date' session and allow members of the steering groups to meet with each other. After the overview the Chairs of each steering Group will gather their group members together to develop and move forward the thinking and planning process that has been undertaken to-date

Resident involvement

Once the steering groups are established there will be many events and opportunities for all residents to feed into the NP process to ensure as many views are captured as possible. Any resident who would like to feed information in advance of the open meetings can email the Parish Clerk, Kevin Finch, at whimpleparishcouncil@gmail.com who will pass any comments onto the respective steering groups. The NP survey results from last year, which are also on the Parish Website for all to see (www.whimpleparishcouncil@weely.com, will also help the steering groups understand the views of those residents who responded.

Feedback from the various meetings and events will help to lead up to the first draft of the Whimple NP. This will be openly shared and from further comments and feedback a final Whimple NP will be ready to move into stage 3

Stage 3 - Bringing the plan into force

The proposed neighbourhood plan will be submitted to the local planning authority, which will check that proper procedures have been followed in its preparation and that any necessary assessments accompany the plan. Following a period of publicity, the local planning authority will arrange for an independent examination. It will also organise the public referendum, subject to the plan meeting legal requirements.

Continued overleaf

By when?

The Councillors would like to see the NP brought to completion as soon as it is possible. It would be good to see the plan completed by the 31 December 2020, or at the very least be at referendum stage and be finalized within the current financial year ending 31 March 2021. The timescales will very much depend on the speed and efficiency of the respective steering groups but there is an appetite to 'get the job done'.

My Dear Friends,

As I sit here in my study writing this it feels a bit like I have stepped onto the plot of some sort of film; the scenes we are seeing on our TVs, the stories we are reading in the paper or on the web seem like an awful dream. What is more, it seems certain there is worse to come, possibly far worse? We are all going to lose loved ones, family and friends, and we seem powerless to stop it.

To make things worse, we cannot go to see those we love and to hold them, and we cannot even kiss them goodbye.

How did we come to this? Over the last decade I have read several articles and watched TV shows where various diseases had been predicted to cause this sort of pandemic but, like most of us, I had thought it impossible. Those sort of threats, like the giant asteroid or the super volcano, seemed like mildly entertaining TV, but nothing I ever lost sleep over. Yet, here we are - the unthinkable has become a new and awful reality. As I watch the drama unfold, it seems this virus has the power not just to harm or kill us, but to bring out both the best and the worst of humanity: selflessness or selfishness, fear or courage, anger or love.

A country which six months ago was in the grip of an epidemic of obesity is now in turmoil because of the fear of food shortages. A continent which six months ago was desperately trying to remain united is now full of countries shutting their borders and, here within the UK, we have anger towards British people who have become unwanted migrants in their own country.

As a church we also face a terrible crisis. Many of our congregation fall within the groups that are most vulnerable, many are lonely or isolated - yet a big part of the support and fellowship we were able to offer, we have been compelled to stop. No amount of phone calls or emails make up for our lost services and coffee mornings etc., and the warmth of real human contact. When we are perhaps needed the most, we feel helpless. Meanwhile, this is just the tip of the iceberg when it comes to the turmoil and suffering this virus seems able to inflict.

But here we are, there is no turning back the clock. We cannot change where we find ourselves, but we can change what happens from now on. We are now all history makers; we can shape the way this village looks back on this crisis.

This virus reminds us of our shared humanity with all of God's people. It doesn't respect national boundaries, skin colour, gender, sexuality, class or religion. We truly are all in this together.

It also reminds us that we are not immortal. Life is a fragile and wonderful gift we should not take for granted and we are not all-powerful. This tiny organism is wreaking havoc around the globe and, for all our ingenuity and science, at the moment at least, we seem powerless to stop it.

But it will end. We can see from China that a peak will be reached, after which, things will improve and a vaccine will eventually be found. Until then we will only ride out this storm if we work together.

For now, we can start small in our own communities, by finding creative ways to love our neighbours so that not one person feels abandoned or forgotten.

Wake every morning and think 'today I will make a difference', and then carry that through in whatever way you can, no matter how small.

This is a defining point for our country. This is something historians will teach for many generations and we will be judged by how we reacted. I wonder what their verdict will be: selflessness or selfishness, fear or courage, anger or love.

For now, do not feel embarrassed to admit you are afraid. There are volunteer groups who can deliver essential supplies and collect medicines, our wonderful village shop, our pubs, the team at the Cranbrook Pharmacy and so many others are working hard to keep the community safe and well.



'An apple a day keeps the doctor away'. We all should be OK in Whimple, as there are plenty of orchards about, but if only it could be that easy? At the time of writing,, at the beginning of March, there is a lot of concern about the coronavirus. We have our own village surgery and, down the road, the Coleridge Medical Centre. However, you could argue that, in these times, it would be useful to have beds available in Ottery St Mary Hospital, to have 100,000 Doctors and Nurses nationwide (which are already needed), especially with issues of bed blocking, which would free up space at the Royal Devon and Exeter Hospital. In addition, there is clearly much need for more cash in the social care budget as a result of drastically reduced funding by the Government since 2010.

The POW&R group has other issues. The health of our village and how our village is going to feel, to look like, to maintain its own identity. Five of our team have been giving evidence to the Planning Inspector at the hearing stage of the Cranbrook Local plan. This is important, because of the housing estate being proposed east of Cobden's Lane, within our parish, and a huge estate of houses near to Hand and Pen. All of this is contrary to the wishes and desires of villagers, and that of Rockbeare and the Cranbrook Town Council members.

We have all put our case to the Inspector, including citing the importance of the Localism Act 2011. It has been stated, "That any scheme protects surrounding villages from development and that life can remain distinct and be separate sustainable communities, in accordance with the principles of good Town and Country Planning and the will of its 'local' people. This places 'localism' at the heart of developing neighbourhood and master plans". POW&R group is really making its presence felt at these hearings.

It was agreed by Cabinet, of East Devon District Council at their meeting on 8th January 2020, that the Whimple Neighbourhood Plan Area should be extended to cover the whole Parish. This is good news, although time is against us in protecting the western flank of a Parish against the developer's powerful influence on Cranbrook New Town. It was created on the principle of being a 'developer led' New Town.

POW&R has learnt that there will now be a significant delay to the decision-making of the Cranbrook Plan, owing to some issues regarding the viability of the development. According to POW&R Group Secretary, Helen Badley; "It would appear that there are some quite fundamental discrepancies regarding viability between the Developers and EDDC.

Of the 60 points that were raised as issues at a meeting between the parties on 2nd Feb 2020, they only managed to reach agreement on ONE of them. Consequently, the Inspector decided to postpone the hearing session on viability and has requested more work to be undertaken to iron out the areas where there is disagreement"

POW+R Group Campaigning

POW+R Group has also conducted a major leaflet campaign on a proposed development of land west of Gribble Lane for 200 homes, adjacent to the Grange Hotel (Planning Application Reference 19/1798/MOUT). This land was designated as Open Countryside in the Rockbeare Neighbourhood Plan. Part of this site is designated as SANGS (Suitable Alternative Natural Green Spaces) land, contrary to the written policy of the Cranbrook Master Plan. The idea of this land classification is to, not only provide recreational space and open agricultural land, but, more significantly, also to provide a buffer-zone between surrounding villages, linked to the natural landscape. It is very clear that the developers are endeavouring to build on this land, which is totally unacceptable behaviour from the developers. Critically, of 104 comments/letters made to EDDC, none supported the applications.


I think this spells out categorically that the local people have said "NO".

This appears to be a significant setback for the Cranbrook developers and could take a minimum of 6 months to resolve. It looks as though this will delay any decision-making on the Gypsy and Travellers site, for which there is another hearing date planned. The good news is that this delay gives us more time to develop our strategy of objection down the line.

The Parish Council is in the process of formulating the Neighbourhood Plan Sub-Committees. It is my understanding that each of the four groups has a member of the POW&R Group, which should make a significant presence and be able to move the process forward. The target date for completion is the 3st December 2020.

Please let us know what matters to you, so that we can more effectively represent your views. Our key remits are to maintain a three-way communication flow between villagers, the Parish Council and the POW&R Group.

Coronavirus

The Parish Council cannot control what people do in their personal time and how they choose to respect (or not) the guidance from HM Gov or indeed take additional steps to limit their exposure. From your District Coun

The guidance on coronavirus issued by central government has now been reinforced by strict instructions that are so important for the safety of all of us that they bear repeating:

For the next three weeks we all must stay at home except for shopping for basic necessities, daily exercise, any medical need and travelling to and from **essential** work.

Anyone who is over 70, and has an underlying health condition or is pregnant, must avoid face-to-face interaction with friends and family.



It is really important that everyone continues to protect themselves by washing their hands more often, for at least 20 seconds, with soap and water. Make sure you cough or sneeze into a tissue, put it in a bin and wash your hands.

Anyone who shows symptoms of a continuous cough and/or a high temperature is being asked to self-isolate for 7 days. This means people should stay at home and avoid all but essential contact with others for 7 days from the point of displaying mild symptoms, to slow the spread of infection.

- If you live alone and you have symptoms of coronavirus illness (COVID-19), however mild, stay at home for 7 days from when your symptoms started. See ending isolation for more information
- If you live with others and you or one of them have symptoms of coronavirus, then all household members must stay at home and not leave the house for **14 days**. The 14-day period starts from the day when the first person in the house became ill
- If anyone else in the household starts showing symptoms, they can leave 7 days after their symptoms started. People who remain well can leave after 14 days.

14 days is the maximum incubation period for coronavirus; people who remain well after 14 days are unlikely to be infectious.

The symptoms are:

- a high temperature (37.8 degrees and above) you feel hot to touch on your chest or back
- a new, continuous cough this means you've started coughing repeatedly

Do not go to a GP surgery, pharmacy or hospital.

You do not need to contact 111 to tell them you're staying at home.

Testing for coronavirus is not needed if you're staying at home.

If you live with someone who is 70 or over, has a long-term condition, is pregnant or has a weakened immune system, try to find somewhere else for them to stay for 14 days.

If you have to stay at home together, try to keep away from each other as much as possible

Only if symptoms become worse should you use the NHS 111 service. To ensure the phone service is readily available to those who need it, where possible people should use the 111 website rather than calling.

If your symptoms worsen during home isolation or are no better after 7 days contact NHS 111 online at 111.nhs.uk. If you have no internet access, you should call NHS 111.

For a medical emergency dial 999.





It is also my birthday as it happens, which I share year for year with that day. My mother never let me forget it, saying it meant she missed the best party ever!


Both anniversaries are reason enough to ring the bells, which we had planned do here in Whimple together with others across the country.

The Ottery St Mary Food Bank

Following a decision to operate a 'Reverse Advent Calendar' in our office at Build Consultants Ltd in the run up to Christmas 2019, we have decided to set up a regular collecting point for the Ottery St Mary Food Bank.

We would like to thank those in the village who donated to our 'Reverse Advent Calendar' initiative after reading about it on Facebook. The idea being that each day in Advent, we would add an item to the food bank box instead of opening a flap on an advent calendar to receive an item, such as chocolate, wine, cheese or even socks!

The Ottery St Mary Food Bank are very grateful for the three boxes of food that we delivered to them and have provided the following information regarding the scheme being operated in the town:

You will be aware that poverty is a very real issue in our society, especially in the current financial situation. Church leaders and representatives from statutory agencies in the town have commented on incidents of food crisis amongst individuals and families, and the need to establish some kind of emergency provision for these people. Members of Churches Together in Ottery (CTIO) decided to take the initiative and launch a food bank in the town. We operate as follows:

- The bank only deals in non-perishable food, but with a variety such that it will provide a balanced diet.
- Churches in the town host collection points. An additional box is located in Roberts Hardware. Members of the community are invited to deliver specific contributions to these points.
- Church leaders and representatives of agencies in the town will be provided with vouchers that entitle the bearer to food sufficient for their household for 3 days. They or their staff will give vouchers to people who they consider are in crisis with regard to food.
- The Food Bank will be open at The URC in Jesu Street, Ottery, on Friday afternoons from 1.30 to 2.30pm. Voucher holders will be able to redeem their vouchers between those times.
- We also provide vouchers to collect fresh fruit and vegetables from Otter Produce in the Square and Fuel Key top ups from McColls opposite the Church. This service depends on cash donations from the public.

SOMETHINGTO MAKE YOU LAUGH!

Amongst the History Society Archives there are lots of items that can bring a smile to your face, or make you laugh out loud. One such item is a pamphlet by 'Jan Stewer' about the trials and tribulations of dairy farmers. An extract is reproduced below, with more to follow next time.

RULES & REGILLATIONS OF THE NEW MILK AND DAIRIES ORDER According to JAN STEWER

Rules and Regillations

For the hine-drance and bewilderment of all Varmers and sitch as keeps cows; and to provide 'em with zummat to occupy their spare time and use up their spare cash if they've got any

The following Rules and Regillations is to be fulfilled in regards to all Shippins, Sheds, or any plaaces where cows is kept for the purpose o' being milked; and also in regards to all they what do's the milking and all their friends and relations.

INSPECTORS

All cowsheds must be ready fer inspection at any time o' day or night by eether o' the following people:-

The Local Sanitary Authority, Inspector of Cruelty to Animals, Skule Attendance Ossifer, Council Surveyor, Medical Ossifer of Health, Boy Scouts, Girl Guides, The Village Postman, Town Crier, Rate Collector, Cap'm o' the Vire Brigade, the Mimber o' Parlyment, the Distric Nurse and The President o' the Church Council.

If eether-one o' these people pays a visit to the varm the varmer must leave whatever he's about and go around and assist 'em to poke their noses into his business.

If he don't he'll be vined vive pound.

COWHOUSES

All cowsheds must face towards the zouth. Any what faces towards the north mus' be turned around or pulled down and putt up fresh. Ten pound vine fer all cowsheds what faces in the wrong derection.

Every cowshed must have a winder oppozyte each crub, so's the cows can look out and view the scenery, and the winders mus' be clained twice a week. Vorty shullins vine for durty winders.

All winders must have blines to pull up and down in case the zun shude be too hot.

All cowsheds mus' be furnished in a proper manner with aisy cheers and a sofa, so's the cows can rest comferable arter meals. A pianner or orgin shude be pervided if the varmer or eether of his chaps can play 'em. If not, there shude be a grannyfone or the wireless, as cows is very partial to music.

Ev'ry cow mus' be pervided with a looking-glass, to see if her horns is on straight. Powder puffs is not compulsory but is highly recommended.

All cowsheds mus' be pervided with bath-rumes with hot an' cold watter; wan

bath-rume to every three cows. Vive pound vine fer every bath-rume not pervided.

The vloors of all cowsheds mus' be covered with carpet. Linoleum won't do, cus it strikes cold to the cows' veet, and is hard to lie upon. A doormat mus' be putt to every door for the chaps to wipe their boots upon bevore they goes in.

Picshers shude be hanged around the walls to make the place bright and cheerful, but not photos o' the varmer or his misses, cus cows has feelings.

A bell must be pervided for each cow so's he can ring fer the varmer if he shude want aught in the night.

With regards to payments for shopping/prescriptions etc. the options are: bank transfers, click and collect, cash on delivery of items* (please see the note below) and credit notes/goodwill. This will differ from house to house and is entirely up to you how you want to work it.

If people are struggling to pay for things, then please get in touch with Marc Kerslake with regards to the donation box at the church.

The most important thing to remember is that both parties must wash their hands before and after deliveries take place.

*Cash on delivery, rather than before, to hopefully stop scammers. It might be best to tell anyone that does ring you, that you do not accept cash upfront.

Please, please everyone, stick to the rules, at least 2 metres apart at all times, wash hands, then wash hands again and stay safe.

The response we've had in this village of people wanting to help out has been overwhelming. There is so much kindness happening, and it's important to remember that, at the moment, there is good happening in the world too.
