



Now - a couple of points for the forthcoming season of goodwill to all persons (- pc or what!): Monday 15th December is likely to be the busiest day of the year in the Post Office - you have been warned;

Last suggested dates for Christmas posting are:

Western Europe 15th Dec; Inland 2nd Class 18th Dec. and 1st class 20th Dec.

New service - if you buy postal orders to give to charity they are now printed on the back with an area for you to complete which will enable the charity to claim income tax back and make the gift worth to them considerably more than it cost you to buy! It makes good sense and is worth more to the charity than a straight cash donation.

We now offer top ups for mobile phone charge cards -swipe card type top ups for all mobiles including Tesco (- and I didn't even know Tesco had one!).

Remember (with all that spending you are now doing) if you bank with Lloyds/TSB, Barclays or Alliance & Leicester, you can get cash from the P.O. using only debit card and pin number; or cash a cheque for Cooperative, Cahoot & Smile -all free of charge; then -if you have any cash left -you can pay it, and any cheques, in at the P.O. for all these banks. New things lined up for the P.O. -sometime in the future unsecurity and credit cards, and a lot more banks tied in as are our current partners, Lloyds, Barclays & Alliance & Leicester. It appears that the loans and credit card initiatives are due to a tie up with the Bank of Ireland who have put up a massive amount of cash.

As Heather & I come towards our tenth Christmas in Whimple (- hah! hah! you thought you would have got rid of us by now) I wonder about how the village has been ageing me, not gracefully I fear, but am I near that age as defined by Clement Freud who says that you feel your age if when asked by a young lady to come upstairs and make love to her you have to reply' I can do one or the other dear but not both'; Sadly, I have not been so invited thus am not sure how I'm doing!

Hopefully I will have the chance to 'phone round those still to pay, but if you want to contact me first please do – I'm on 822415.



Sorry the appearance of The Knees was shortened at the Auction but we had a night turn together (The Tardis never shuts!) and we had to get the tea brewing! The Knees bought some fine items including a shopping trolley which I hasten to add, was still in the back of my car until an old lady poked me in the back at the station and said 'Would you give an old lady a trolley for her shopping – my one's just broken, the wheel's fallen off', to which I gladly offered to assist for the sum of £2.50. 





St. Mary's Church Whimple



There has probably been a church building in Whimple since Saxon times. The present building dates from the 15th century, standing as a witness to the Christian faith and as the focal point for worship in the parish. In recent years the south front has been restored and the nave and aisles have been reroofed, funded by grants from English Heritage and the generosity of church members and the community at large.

We are now facing Phase 3 of the restoration which is primarily work on the tower and a series of minor works elsewhere. The tower is probably older than the date 1571 which is inscribed above the west door, and it houses a ring of six bells, three of which date from about 1400, 1450 and 1600. The tower needs re-roofing and extensive repairs to the stonework, and we estimate that the total cost of Phase 3 will be in the region of £40,000. After grants and existing resources we are likely to have to raise a further £20,000

We hope that the village will again support our efforts to raise the necessary funds to ensure that Whimple's most historic building is handed down to future generations in good order and available for the whole community whenever it might be needed. If you can help in any way, financially or in kind, or have ideas for fund raising, please contact one of the co-ordinators of the Friends of Whimple Church.





FIRE SAFETY

Improving your home security does not need to make it more difficult to escape in It is a good idea to have a fire emergency. escape plan and make sure everyone in the house is aware of what they should do in the case of a fire. This is especially important if you are having visitors over the festive season.

Early warning of a fire is essential and the most effective safeguard is a correctly fitted smoke alarm which meets British Standard 5446 Part 1. At least one detector should be fitted on every level of the house or flat, fixed horizontally on the ceiling. Check your alarm is working properly once a month and replace the battery every year.

If a smoke alarm keeps going off, don't disconnect it: it's doing its job. Ask the fire brigade for advice on the best location for your smoke alarms so they will not go off unnecessarily, such as when you are cooking.

People who are unable to hear a conventional smoke alarm can obtain a device such as a vibrating pad or flashing light.

It is a good idea to disengage the mortice lock on the front door while you are asleep so you can get out quickly if visibility is reduced.

At night close all doors opening on to the staircase as this will delay the rate at which the fire spreads, giving you additional time to escape.

Before you go to bed, switch off as many electrical appliances as possible, check gas appliances and put a guard in front of open fires. Also, make sure cigarettes and candles are properly extinguished and always keep matches and lighters away from children.

The fire service recommends keeping a punch hammer suitable for breaking double glazed windows if there are no opening windows upstairs, these are available at good hardware shops.

For more information on fire safety contact your local fire service.

Don't forget that in the run-up to Christmas, sneak thieves are at their busiest. Christmas presents are a big temptation!!!!!!!

Keep your property secure and take all steps to deter the thief.



Planning Application for the New Community

On Monday 17th November the Parish Council arranged a public meeting to seek our views on a planning application for 2900 dwellings between Broadclyst and Whimple that had been submitted by the consortium of builders. About 40 villagers were there. I have tried to summarise the views of those present.

The meeting was chaired by Councillor Peter Bowden who made it clear that the consultation that evening was not on the principle of the new community in the Local Authority's Structure Plan but was confined to seeking views on the particular planning application that had been received.

The foremost concern was that of flooding. It was felt that the risk to Whimple would increase as a consequence of the development, and that the proposed attenuation ponds were not adequate to prevent this.

It was also felt that transport to and from Whimple could suffer as a result of the new development. The new station could present a threat to ours and it was essential that our station was kept open. The extra traffic on the old A30 was likely to become a problem. Access to Exeter at peak times is already becoming difficult and the A30 would become even more congested with our lanes becoming 'ratruns' to avoid the jams.

Concerns were expressed about the availability of sufficient places at both primary and secondary schools as the new community developed. The present primary school is vital to our village community and must not close when the schools on the new development are established.

The plans did not appear to include a church and it was feared that other community welfare facilities such as a medical centre and community hall would not be provided in time. This raises the danger that existing facilities such as Ottery Hospital would not be able to cope.

The proposal was for a high proportion of 'affordable housing' in one relatively small area. It was felt very strongly that this did not meet the needs of the wider community. It failed to allow young families to remain in the communities they grew up in. This is to the detriment of communities elsewhere in Devon. It concentrated less expensive properties in one development, running the risk of creating an area where social problems could arise.

The word 'coalescence' was used to reflect the danger that, in time, the new development would grow to encompass Broadclyst, Rockbeare and Whimple to form one single, massive residential area. The current proposal claims to set out to avoid this by showing a 'Green Wedge' between the new houses and Whimple. In principle this seems to be a good thing. However the Green Wedge shown on the plan covered only part of the area between the new development and Whimple suggesting that there was scope for future development in the gap. It was felt strongly that the Green Wedge should reach from Whimple all the way to the edge of the development shown on the plan.

There were aspects of the new development that some people welcomed. However, the overwhelming feeling was against it.


Broadband 4Whimple
