FROM MY WINDOW IN THE SQUARE

Have you leant upon a gate, without a need for words

Yes, leaning on a gate is a thing we ought to do more often
It helps us to unwind, reflect and soften



Leaning on a gate, I have seen the sun break through to illuminate a small field when youthful Spring around us breathes and every glade shines sweetly. Then I think what sunshine is to flowers, sweet smiles are to humanity. I see the primrose bank with its faint fragrance that awakes my senses and I think 'what a wonderful world'. Give to the world the best you have and sure enough the best will come back to you. And when I hear the thrush I think how eloquently well he sings. The dazzle of his song and mirth delight me with joy and wonder. When I see each star rise, sink and fade, then the sun shining sweetly, and for me each bird that sings its song sparks in me a spirit that leaps with gladness. My


little walks give me such pleasure especially when nature appears so fresh and fair. To breathe the morning air makes me remember the days when larks whistled so sweetly as they flew in May.

When the sunny beams warm up the soil, the appearance of the first flush of annual weeds is better than any thermometer to indicate that Spring is not too far away. Another harbinger of Spring is the arrival of the swallows. Their graceful flight to catch insects in the sky, circling here, circling there. I do hope that they will come back to their nest in my drangway which they have abandoned the last two years and how I miss them.

I don't think there is a more delightful sight than the delicate bluebells along the lane banks. Their heads strongly arched, their powdery blue trumpets. It makes you feel the gladness of The May, nothing can bring back the hours of the waving grasses or the glory of the flowers when the insects as small as dust are reeling in the sun a glittering dance. I also like the large bindweeds with their white bells, wild hops and streaked woodbines and the cascading eglantines.

I think that a hedgerow bank bright with primroses, violets and barren strawberries must be one of the most evocative signs of Spring, with a few wood orchids for good measure. We are so lucky in Devon that primroses are still plentiful and orchids too as uprooting is now prohibited.

The primrose was the favourite flower of Benjamin Disraeli who always wore one in his buttonhole. He was also known as Lord Beaconsfield and in 1882 The Primrose League was founded. Ever since, the statue of Disraeli has been decked with a primrose wreath on the 19th April. The Primrose League was founded in his honour to perpetuate his constitution principles. He was a conservative politician and also a gifted novelist. He was Prime Minister in Queen Victoria's reign and it was during his premiership that Queen Victoria became the first Empress of India. He created the British Empire. Ironically, now I hear that primroses are scarce around Beaconsfield due to over-enthusiastic picking on April 19th each year.




It features a Radio Devon radio studio from which broadcast journalists Vic Morgon and Liz Scott will be broadcasting live on Radio Devon, including interviews with villagers and features about the village. They will also talk to and explain to visitors about the studio and Radio Devon.


Also operating will be Devon County Council Communications Service with a learning suite with computers and advisors available to open up the world of computers, the Internet and e-mail. If you wish to know how to use these or improve your present skills the advisors can help you.



Whimple Parish Council Meeting

On many occasions while walking through the Square I have paused to read the Parish Council Minutes and planning applications. Everyone is invited to attend the Parish Council meetings and the dates are posted on the board – I am always surprised to read that there are often no members of the public who attend and the maximum seems to be two. So, on 16th January, I thought I would go along and see what happened.

I sat with the only two members of public present and the council members seemed pleased the three of us had turned up. The meeting started with a 10-minute open session for the members of the public – this was very quick as I was only there to observe! The meeting then turned to the agenda that we were given a copy of so we could follow the proceedings.

The subject of the new doggy bins was brought up, as there had been two letters of complaint that one of the bins was too prominent – I thought that was the idea! We need to give dog walkers as much encouragement as possible to pick up dog mess and as one who regularly walks the lanes I think the situation has improved since the introduction of these bins.

There was also a request for consideration of another street light between Bramley Gardens and the New Fountain on Church Road as it is very dark where the road narrows – the various options were discussed.

Jim Tyrrell our local policeman reported there were 17 incidents reported to the police in January from Whimple parish. Five crimes which were letters sent to persons to cause fear and distress, a theft of a farm gate which one of the councillors was able to update Jim to say the gate had been returned and was hanging back where it belonged and a drink driver. I was reassured to hear what a safe area we live in.

Parish maintenance was discussed and I wondered how many of us notice potholes in the road and other work that needs doing and report these things to a councillor or do we just leave it for someone else to notice and report?

The tricky question of grants then came up; the parish council had notified village organisations that it was time for them to apply for grants from the council. Requests had been received from a number of organisations and, although they were all worthy causes, some tough decisions had to be made and it was obvious from the start that some were going to be disappointed. The council already had committed money for a bus shelter in the Square and to pipe water up to the allotments so the remainder was to be divided between the organisations. The merits of each request were looked at and some lively debate between the councillors ensued, compromises and difficult decisions were made.

I left before the end of the meeting, however I found most of the meeting very interesting and would certainly go again. The councillors are your elected representatives so if there are any village issues bring them to the council's attention.

WE'VE ALWAYS DONE IT THAT WAY

or The History of Standard Railway Gauge - Anon

“Why is the Standard Railway Gauge (the distance between the rails) in the United States of America such an odd size?”

“When they tried other sizes the wheels broke on the long distance rutted roads in England because that’s the spacing of the ruts”.


“So who built the original rutted roads?”

“The Romans did for their Legions, as they did throughout Europe. The ruts formed as a result of much use by Roman war chariots and other wagons”.

“So why did Imperial Rome build their chariots that size?”

“Because that was the width of two horses which was the standard motive power for each chariot”.

Now move forward 2000 years or so. When you see a Space Shuttle sitting on it’s launch pad waiting for the off, pay particular attention to the two big booster rockets attached to the sides of the main fuel tank. These are solid rocket boosters made by Thiokol at their factory in Utah. NASA engineers who specified these would have preferred them to be a bit fatter, but they had to be transported by train from the factory to the launch site, and the railroad is routed through a tunnel in the mountains, the width of which was based on standard gauge track, which as we have already discussed, is about the size of two horses’ backsides.



So a major Space Shuttle design feature of what is arguably the most advanced transportation system ever invented was determined over two thousand years ago by the width of rear ends of two war horses.

So next time you are told “We have always done it that way”, it may pay to wonder why.



Concert in St. Mary's Church, Whimble

World Premiere - 19th June

Throughout most of the 30+ years we have lived in the village there seem to have been oboists in or around Whimble - I'm one. I've often thought that the Village Church would make an ideal venue for a chamber-sized orchestra and have decided, at last, to do something about organising one.

I have played all round the area for many years and made many friends in music. One group I play with, Abbas Music group, directed by Derek Browning, would seem to be the ideal size (17-20 players) and tends to concentrate on baroque to early & late classics. For many years we have been giving very successful summertime concerts and including early Haydn and Mozart Symphonies with concertos of the same period.

Derek Browning is a professional musician and well-known in the region and some years ago he honoured three of his friends, including me, by writing three concertos and dedicating one to each of us. These he calls the Colemere Concertos and are, respectively for recorder, bassoon and oboe d'amore (a slightly lower-pitched oboe much favoured by Bach and Telemann and now becoming popular with modern composers). The Oboe d'amore Concerto is tuneful and has a haunting slow movement and this concert will be its first performance.

To cut a long story short, with great encouragement from others, especially Rob Wilkinson and Sarah Smith, we are to present a concert in Whimble Church on 19 June. The programme will probably comprise:

- Suite in D major by Telemann
- Symphony No 1 by Mozart
- Colemere Concerto for Oboe d'amore & Strings
- Symphony No 39 by Haydn

Neither of the symphonies is very long. There will be an interval in the concert when it is hoped to serve wine or soft drinks (to be included in the ticket price). We hope that the players and audience can mix during the interval. It is intended to make just a nominal ticket charge for accompanied children in the hope that they will be brought to enjoy live music and take the opportunity to chat to the players and see their instruments.

Finally, in recognition of the importance of this historic church in our growing community, and the constant need for funds to preserve its fabric, profits from the concert will go to St. Mary's Church, Whimble. We hope to announce details of where to obtain tickets shortly. Meanwhile please telephone me on 01404 822344 if you would like further information.


SCOUTS


CHARITY SKITTLES MATCH

The Healthy Option

Your senior readers can ignore this at their peril, for intensive care beds are now in short supply.

In November, Prime Minister Blair, answering reporters after his chest pains, said, "The public should take all the measures they can to improve their health."

An experiment carried out in Holland lasting two years, enrolled 3000 retired persons to forgo milk in their tea, which resulted in a 53% reduction heart problems reported, compared with the national average, at no cost whatever but a substantial saving in hospital care. So milk in later life clogs up the arteries because it is produced for rearing calves, not humans.

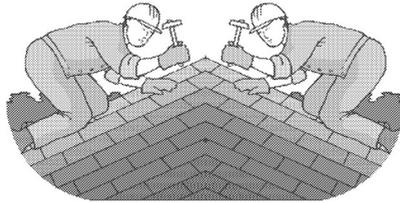

Be aware and cautious.
The CAB gives the following general advice:

Your rights if the work or goods and materials supplied are unsatisfactory

REFUND

If you have paid a deposit, the work has not started and the trader is in breach of contract you should be entitled to a refund, for example, if it was a condition that work would commence before a certain date and that date has passed. If work has started, you would usually be expected to allow the trader to rectify the problem, unless you can justify why they should not return, for example, if has work has been left in a dangerous condition.

REPLACEMENT OR REPAIR

From 31st March 2003, if you buy goods from a trader who also installs them for you, you can ask the trader to replace or repair the goods free of charge if they are faulty, or if they were installed without reasonable care or skill.

- If it is impossible to replace or repair the goods; or
- replacement or repair would be unreasonably costly for the trader when compared with alternative remedies; or
- the trader fails to replace or repair the goods within a reasonable time of having agreed to do so, or causes you significant inconvenience;
- then you can ask for a partial or full refund. The amount of money you get back may be reduced to take account of any use that you have had out of the goods.

COMPENSATION


You **may** be entitled to compensation if: -

- the work was not carried out with reasonable care and skill, or finished within a reasonable time; or
- the trader has been negligent, for example has put in new windows which let in water when it rains and you have to redecorate; or
- you have accepted a repair, which turns out to be unsatisfactory; or the goods or services are unsafe and someone has suffered injury.
- you have incurred additional expenses or suffered inconvenience because of the breach of contract, for example, the cost of employing someone else to rectify faults, when the original trader was unable or unwilling to do so.

You should always take legal advice before accepting compensation for personal injury.




