The Parish Paths Partnership

On Friday 22 October, nearly a dozen British Trust for Conservation Volunteers (BCTV) arrived in Whimple for a Hedge Laying Weekend'. The hedge bordering the footpath which leads from Elizabeth Close to The Green was steeped' for most of it's length using traditional tools and methods.

The numbers of BCTV volunteers were swelled by others from the village. Comments made by passers-by were most complimentary and full of encouragement.

A week or so before, a group of young farmers began an ongoing project to improve drainage in the area of Bogmoor Lane. BCTV were also involved and had hoped to begin hedge laying in the area but heavy rain overnight on Saturday and Sunday, followed by continuous rain on Sunday morning, prevented further work.

The Parish Paths Partnership (known as P3) is a partnership of local people, Parish and District councils, and local and national businesses. It exists to provide funds to maintain 'rights of way' throughout the country. Volunteers are always needed for local projects and no special skills are necessary.

The north wind blows
and we shall have snow
and what will poor robin do then?
Poor thing
He'll sit in a barn
to keep himself warm
and hide his head under his wing
Poor thing
(From Songs for a Nursery 1805)

The daylight dwindles fast now that the Summer is nearly over. The dead leaves tumble from the trees and make a golden carpet on the green grass. Some of the leaves are swept across The Square by a leaf-picking wind. In the early hours the redbreast haunts the garden hedges and when the sun breaks through its bright plumage shines. The robin has such intelligent ways and is always on the alert. Sometimes he becomes quite quarrelsome with his fellow robins who may encroach on to his territory. The defence of territory is the Robin's life and the main reason for his plaintive song which is heard all year around, except for a brief period in July. In the late Summer when the young birds have put on their adult plumage there is a great deal of disputing of territories as borders are established.

In 1961, the Council for Bird Preservation were set the task of choosing Britains national bird. After a lengthy correspondence in the personal column of The Times, they chose the Robin, that chest puffing individualist whose tameness is a tribute to the English character. On the Continent, robins are shy birds keeping to deep woodlands, but strange enough in England, in my garden, the robin is bold enough to dog my footsteps. He becomes quite cheeky and daring when I fork in the flowerbeds digging up the occasional worm. He also likes to sit on my spare fork handle and observe what I am going to do next. A dear little presence. At this time of the year his song is a clear short warble and is always the first that one hears in the morning.

As we are approaching December fast and Christmas cards are displayed


Leslie Carter

in the shops, I always marvel at the number of them featuring the robin redbreast. There are also a great number of legends attached to the robin especially Christmas stories. One legend tells us that it is unwise to say something unkind about farm and domestic animals or birds around Christmastide because it is believed that robins understand human language until midnight on Christmas Eve when the sounding of bells announcing the birth of Christ dispel this power.

As robins are my favourite birds legends about them appeal to me, especially the one which decrees that it is very lucky indeed to have robin fly into your home during Christmas. Prosperity and good fortune are foretold to those who see a robin before midday on Christmas Day. In remote country areas it was most unlucky to kill a robin who is considered a sacred bird. Another legend tells how the robin got his red breast feathers.

The first version tells that the robin took pity on Jesus on The Cross and tried to pluck the thorns from his crown. In doing so he wounded himself, but Jesus blessed him and said that his previously brown feathers would forever after be bright red and he would be known as Bird of God. A similar story is attributed to the Holly, which is supposed to have its red berries through blood from Christ's wound dripping on to the white berries of the holly tree growing near the cross. In some parts of Europe it is still known as Christ's thorn.

In my garden, the robin loves to sit on the holly tree and eat its red berries. There are usually none left for my Christmas decorations. If you see a little robin, bob, bob, bobbing along in your garden I am sure that, if it is not too cold, you will dig up a worm or two for his Christmas dinner.



You will be glad to hear that we have had another 'site survey' re: computer installation -and the latest firm date we have had for "go" is - not before April - so in four weeks it has gone back 2 months; at this rate well you can guess when we will be at 'go'! Now to more useful info on last dates for posting:

Letters etc to U.K. - 1st class 21st Dec. 2nd class 18th Dec

Postage of all letters to Europe increased on 25th October and is now 34p up to 20gms, (instead of 30p) and other weights also up e.g. what was 44p is now 48p etc. If you come across a new stamp with no monetary value just an 'E' printed on it can be used on anything in place of 34p stamp (e.g. Europe less than 20gms).

The use of bank facilities for Lloyds/TSB customers is increasing as people find it works exactly as it would in the bank and we welcome you all, and of course Co-op and Girobank customers - we are glad you find the service as convenient as we hoped.

We believe that the Coleridge Medical Centre will no longer take telephone calls for repeat prescriptions (which is a pain) but will take Faxes - so - bring your repeat note in to us and we will fax it for you at a special 'prescription only' price of 25p.

I hear that our holiday replacement chappy sorted a few of you out. He told me what a friendly village Whimble was, and how much he enjoyed his time here - I believe he managed to hide his feelings quite successfully so as not to invite you to take liberties!

The Old Parish Chest Whimble Church

13th to 16th October

The last time I went to see the production of this play, staged by Whimble History Society and Whimble Church, I was most impressed and thought that one could not really improve it in any way. How wrong I was! What I saw on Saturday, was indeed a spectacular 'Son et Lumiere' spectacle of the highest quality. The miming, the sound effect and lighting were quite remarkable.

As the wife of the General Manager of Browns Hotel in London, it was my task as a hostess to invite our guests to go to the Opera and Ballet at Covent Garden, West End shows, Concerts, Wimbledon and Twickenham and have seen many superb productions. I must say that what I saw on Saturday night was of the highest calibre of a West End Production. Congratulations to John Shepherd who has spent years in research, script and sound recording. All those who took part were so very well cast. The contrast between the spectacular lighting and the humble candle holders was very subtle indeed.

In 1993 I was given the task of going through every item in the Parish Chest, a big tin trunk, Some items dated back to 1700s. With the tremendous help of Lee McIntyre, a young computer buff, we put hundreds of historical files and documents on computer disc. We did it on Saturday mornings over a period of six months. I must say we really enjoyed the work which subsequently gave me a greater insight in to the history of Whimble village. I would also mention here that the Reverend Harold Tucker who was our Rector when we came here started collecting cuttings for the village and Parish chest. We used to get far more mentions in the Newspapers than we do now. It would be a good idea to have a correspondent feeding news as so many other villages have.

The Woodbury "Would-be's"



THE OLD PARISH CHEST.

There were only 20 spare seats for the total performances throughout the week. This exceeded my expectations, as did the acclaim with which the Show was received. Some of the comments are shown here:

"I sang in Whimble Choir for many years and took the Stained Glass Windows for granted. To have them explained in such detail with the light behind them was moving for me".

"The rebuilding of the Church was made fittingly dramatic by the removal, during the performance, of the very realistic scenery which depicted the old building".

"The most moving part for me was when the Cross behind the Altar was illuminated internally whilst surrounded by the colourful spectrum of sparkling light".

"The music fitted the action perfectly, enhancing the effect of the dramatisation".

"The hymn tunes played on the chimes was made all the more realistic by the sounds of the mechanism".

"The poignancy of War in Whimble was realistically portrayed by the frightening sound of the two enemy aircraft and machine gun fire".

"The Sound of the organ being re-tuned and then the demonstration of this beautiful instrument was enthralling".

A second estimate is being sought for repairs to the church clock and for a winding system. We have half the money required from kind donations at two funerals and are exploring the possibility of grants for such work.

We are very aware of some uneven surfaces in the floor of the Church and want this attended to as soon as possible. However, a problem has arisen over finding suitable stone - but we will persist.

The P.C.C. voted at its last meeting in favour of making the temporary display area into a permanent feature. At the same time plans are being put into operation to construct a storage cupboard at the other rear end of the Church. The idea will be to utilise wood from the removed pews.

The question of the Mission of our Church has been mooted from time to time. P.C.C. meetings tend to get overloaded with administrative work and practicalities and it is felt that there is little time to dwell on the spiritual side of the Church -sadly. So a special meeting is being held and will be devoted entirely to the subject of our Church's Mission - where we are going, what do we want to do for our congregation and village and why? These are some of the questions we hope to answer.

The P.C.C. wishes to congratulate all those involved in the production of 'The Old Parish Chest. This really was quite splendid. Our sincere thanks are extended to John Shepherd for all his Research, Scriptwriting and magnificent Music, to Barry Roach for the Scenery Design and Construction, to Ian Roberts for the Lighting Effects and, of course, to all the players in this production.



A date for the diary - 10th December - School Christmas Fayre 2pm at the Victory Hall.



THE MILLENNIUM



Whimple church's plans for the Millennium are nearly complete. David Rastall and Raymond Burrough attended the special service in Crediton to collect our Millennium Yew, which was grown from a tree over 2000 years old. This will be planted in the churchyard next spring.

Early in December our Christmas card, which will be delivered to every house in the parish, will be accompanied by a Millennium candle and a special Whimple commemorative medallion/key fob. These gifts from Whimple Church are to mark the 2,000th anniversary of the birth of Jesus Christ. If anyone would like to purchase additional ones they will be available for £1 each. Details of where they can be obtained will be in the church magazine and will be displayed in church.

The candles come with the words of the Millennium Resolution. These have been composed by the 'Millennium Group of Churches Together in England' so that they can be used with integrity not only by Christians, but also by members of other faiths, and by people with no faith. Its simple message is this:-

The Millennium Resolution

**Let there be
respect for the earth
peace for its people
love in our lives
delight in the good
forgiveness for past wrongs
and from now on a new start.**

We have suggested that everyone who wants to might gather in The Square just before midnight on New Year's Eve so that the Millennium moment can be celebrated as a community. Hopefully the bells will be rung, as they will at noon on Saturday 1st January, for a short inter-denominational service to celebrate the birth of Christ, to give thanks for the second Millennium and to seek a blessing on the third Millennium. After the service the church will be open to anyone who would like a light lunch of soup and a roll.

On Sunday 2nd January there will be a Family Service at 11am based on the form of service to be used throughout the country that day. At that time we hope to unveil Whimple's Millennium Stone, inscribed with the words of the Resolution, to permanently commemorate this moment in history.

THE FESTIVAL OF CHRISTINGLE -CHRIST IS LIGHT

It is strange how certain customs which were lost in the mist of time are suddenly revived and take on a new importance in the festivities of Advent leading up to the solemn celebration of Christmas. This charming custom has been brought back in recent years and it is most enchanting to watch children walking in a procession in church, carrying their oranges, topped by a lit candle surrounded by nuts. Their faces are lit up and their eyes shine sweetly.

In the 14th century, in Northern Europe, the festival of Christingle which means Christ is Light, was well favoured by the Church. In ancient times the Christingle itself consisted of a bright red apple, (today it is represented by an orange). The round form of the fruit symbolises the circular shape of the earth. On top of it is a lit candle which embodies the light of the world and around the candle the nuts and small fruit represent the fruit of the earth. A red ribbon encircles the middle of the apple and symbolises the blood of Christ.

Since its revival in England this festival takes place on the last Sunday before Christmas and each child present in church will be given a true Christingle which will be lit with great ceremony whilst a carol is sung. For me this orange and lit candle represents the warmth of our family circle, the happy get-together and yet the oranges conjure up visions of far-away places, Palestine, Israel, Nazareth and the little town of Bethlehem where Christ our Saviour was born.
